hear a proposition from the Creche to have that institution absorbed by the organization of which they are trustees. According to the majority faction, the appearance of the two men was the first that had been heard of the merger proposition by them and the situation became embarrassing to all concerned. There was considerable discussion, but no action, though the position of the majority was too evident to be mistaken, and a few days later ten members wrote in their resignations. Acceptance of these Thursday afternoon settles the matter for the present, but not definitely, according to the minority.
Contention of Majority.
The majority contends that as the Creche is a strictly local institution and the Child Saving Institute statewide in its scope, the Creche has first claim upon local support. During the last year the Creche has boarded about 400 children whose parents work out by the day and have no other place to leave them. The total cost of maintaining the institution has been approximately \$2,000 and of this over \$1,000 has been paid for the board of the children, leaving less than \$1,000 to be subscribed. This deficiency has always been met in the main by annual \$5 subscriptions from business men and others.
and as an emergency fund several small bequests left for its maintenance. These, with such sums added to them from time to time, are being put into a sinking fund as the nucleus of a future endowment fund, at present amounting to about \$5,000. In addition to this the Creche owns its building at Nineteenth and Harney streets.
The lot is owned by the city and is leased to the Creche for twenty-five years, three of which are unexpired. It always has been understood by the board that a continuance of the lease will be granted by the city. This was assured at the time the lease was granted because a day nursery must necessarily be located downtown where it is accessible to working people without payment of car fare.
In the event of a consolidation these funds held in trust would have to be returned to their donors, which, with other conditions existing, would involve considerable litigation.

Ten Members of Board Quit Because of Merging Plan.
RESIGNATIONS ARE ACCEPTED

More Agents Offer Sites to the Woodmen

Fight Narrowing Down to Contest Between Sixteenth and Jackson and Douglas Street.
The Woodmen of the World building will probably go up either at Sixteenth and Jackson or on a Douglas street corner. Other sites are in consideration, but are not being pushed so hard.
C. C. George and E. J. George are the agents for the Sixteenth and Jackson property, which is the old liar residence and was bought a few years ago by Alfred Millard for \$60,000. The Woodmen can buy it for \$10,000 if they like.
Except among people immediately interested for their own reasons general sentiment is in favor of a Douglas street location, for the building will show off better there.
There is no likelihood of an immediate decision by the Woodmen—that is, today or tomorrow, but the verdict will be reached before very long. "We are not going to spend a million in a minute," declared J. C. Root, "but on the other hand we are going to put up the new building at once—practically speaking. When the committee is through I think we shall call a special session of the executive council and wind the thing up."
More offers continue to be made to the committee, but Mr. Root declared that at the most five sites only are in the running. Real estate man after real estate man has visited the committee and argued his claim. Some of these offers are simply preposterous, according to Mr. Root.
