Speaking of the organization, Major Richmond said yesterday: "The organization of this association will make it possible to establish a bureau of Bertillon photographs. The value of such a bureau is shown especially when a person is held for investigation. When we have a character that we think is a bad one, but lack conclusive proof, we can send his measuraments to Des Moines, where the bureau will be located, and receive an answer in twelve hours. It will be a great factor in ficilitating quick detection of criminals. The maintenance of such a bureau will take some money and the association will probably go before the legislature for a small appropriation.
