Steel and Southern Railroad Group Occupy Market's Attention.

Improvement of Flood Conditions is Southwest Has Favorable Effect on Railroad Stocks-Condl-

tion of Money Market.

NEW YORK, July 16.—United States Steel remained the center of interest in the stock market today, but did not so nearly monopolize all of the interest as in yesterday's one sided market. The general tone was firm in spite of exceeding duliness and special stocks made sharp advances. The southern railroad group was consistently

special stocks made sharp advances. The southern railroad group was consistently strong, and this movement might be ascribed to the weak tone in the cotton market following reports of rain in Texas to break the serious drouth there.

The improvement in flood conditions in the southwest was an additional influence in favor of some of that group. There was a good deal of discussion of the money market in view of the large changes indicated for the week in banking items. The gold exports to Argentina made requirements on the New York banks since last Friday of \$12,000,000.

The inflow of cash from the interior continues, although en a diminishing scale, so that an offset to this decrease is to be reckoned, but it is estimated that the net decrease in cash may reach the neighborhood of \$5,000,000. Of even greater interest was the evidence already at hand of further depletion of cash next week unless some movement should spring up to offset the heavy demands of the export move ment of gold to go out to that destination next week from New York is already fixed at \$5,000,000 or over.

The proportions of this movement are proving fermidable to other money markets and London discount rates continue to harden on account of it in spite of London's ability to call on New York to finance the demand. The official report of our foreign trade for June sufficiently explains why foreigners are able to control the international exchanges. The deficiency in foodstuffs exports restricts the status of outgo, while imports have risen \$32,57,000 over those of June last year, leaving a \$7,000,000 excess value of imports.
