Ingham Man Kills Himself

Sam Larue, Who Was Enroute Home from South Omaha, Commits Suicide at Holdrege.

HOLDREGE, Neb., July 20.—(Special Telegram.)—A prosperous farmer named Sam Larue, living at or near Ingham, committed suicide early this morning by shooting himself with a 44 calibre revolver, a few yards east of the Burlington depot.

Stay Away from Turkey is Word to Dr. John Baptist

Parents Warn Him that if He Came There He Would Be Killed.

The Rev. Dr. Hovhannesian Murgurdetcheh Cheneagorayan (John Baptist), the Armenian educator and lecturer who stopped in Omaha on his way back to his home in Turkey when he was warned that it would not be safe for him to go on, has received a letter from his parents advising him to remain here and to make arrangements for them to leave Turkey if possible.

"A letter came last night," said John Baptist, "as he has been known in this country," "which informed me that the Armenian Christians in Turkey live in daily fear of their lives and expect death with every wind that blows. My sister, who is the wife of a professor in a Constantinople college, has not been heard of since a massacre which occurred eleven weeks ago. The letter from my parents was mailed July 11, and it is the first one of many which the Turks, who examine all the mails, have let go through."
