No vote of the society has ever fixed the salary of the secretary at \$1,500 per year. It has been cuntomary hitherto to pay the secretary but a nominal sum, usually \$100.

Third—The amendment to the bylaws, which it may be claimed confers authority on the board of directors to fix the compensation of the secretary is to the extent it professes to act on the question of salary, in direct conflict with the constitutional provision above quoted, and therefore is void.
