The small boats were reported from three to five hours in the rear, but their time allowances are heavy. The Naid at night had nearly eight hours in which to catch up with the Valmore.

There was great interest here as to the position of the racers. The Chicago Yacht club was besieged with inquiries all day. The information, however, was meager. A message was received from Manistee, Mich, in the morning saying that a sloop was passing there, but that this was not one of the racers appeared certain by the later dispatches from Ludington, Point Au Sable and Frankfort.


