With the passing of Mr. Harry Redden, who died at his home at 458 Greenwich York loses a member whose record of narrow escapes during his career on the sea

has been approached by but few. Mr. Redden was a boatswain on the Alabama when the southern barkentine was sunk by the Kearsarge in the battle off Cherbourg on June 19, 1864, and his son, who lives at the same address, believes that he was the last of the crew of that

vessel. Mr. Redden was hanging onto a piece of wreckage after the Alabama sank when he was picked up by the Deerhound, a yacht owned by John Lancaster. He afterward made his way to America. He later returned to London to appear as a witness in the claim case of the United States against England, based on the damage done to United States shipping by the depredations of the Alabama.
