

GOULD TO LAY NEW RAILS

Missouri Pacific Omaha-Kansas City Line to Be Improved.

WORK IS NOW IN PROGRESS

Falls City Will Be Made a Division Point—Belt Line Is Due for Improvements Badly Needed for Years.

The Missouri Pacific is planning to make extensive improvements on its line between Omaha and Kansas City. Work is already under way in some places.

Falls City is to be made a division point under the new arrangements and considerable work is being done in that town, many new tracks and some bridge work being required. The plan contemplates a new and heavier rail all the way from Kansas City to Omaha.

Work requiring the expenditure of over \$100,000 is now in progress in Omaha near the Westside station at Forty-eighth and Leavenworth streets. Extensive terminals and switching yards are to be installed on the south side of Leavenworth street.

After this work is finished it is the purpose of the Missouri Pacific to improve the condition of the belt line, which has been allowed to remain as it was when installed twenty-five years ago.

Some of the grades will be eliminated and a double track installed part of the way.

The belt line is becoming one of the biggest switching propositions in the west and four new locomotives are now being used to handle the cars to the various manufacturing plants and material yards around the city.

This makes quite an operating problem to handle all these trains, as the belt line is also used by the Illinois Central to run its trains to the stock yards.

Often as many as four engines and crews are tied up for a considerable length of time at the "Y" at Forty-sixth and Farnam streets, waiting for one of the numerous trains to get through.

E. M. Vance is in charge of the work on the Omaha terminals.

Iowa Central to Close Here. General offices in Omaha will be opened in a day or two by the Iowa Central railroad, which is operated in connection with the Minneapolis & St. Louis.

Formerly traffic manager of the New Mexico Central, will be the general agent here and the offices will probably be in the Brandeis building.

The road makes connection with the Illinois Central at Storm Lake and will try for Minneapolis business via that line. It also has a St. Louis connection with the Washburn at Albion.

Scheme to Hasten Freight. The Missouri Pacific has started a new scheme for hastening package freight to Omaha, which is meeting with the hearty approval of shippers.

Special cars for less than carload lots are now started daily from Cleveland, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Atlanta and many other points.

These cars make the trip in three days from Indianapolis and five days from the seashore points.

Motor Car a Sensation. The McKean motor car sent east last week to the Erie created quite a sensation in Chicago and railroad officials from all over the country were on hand to witness the test.

The McKean Motor company had agreed to deliver the car to the Erie in New York. The Lake Shore road offered to haul the car from Chicago to New York free of charge that some of its officials might have the pleasure of making the trip to investigate the car.

The reports from the test show that the car was highly satisfactory and indications are that orders will pour in faster than they can be filled by the company in Omaha.

The McKean Motor Car company now employs 45 men and needs more room. No more room is available on the Union Pacific land in the shop yards at the consequence offers of new locations are coming in.

Bank May Buy New York Life Building Now. Omaha National Said to Have Concluded Terms for the Purchase.

The belief is strong in business circles that the Omaha National bank has concluded to close on its option for the New York Life building.

The option is for \$500,000 and runs to October 1. President Joseph H. Millard has not admitted that his corporation has finally decided, though he told an inquirer that "one proposition is getting pretty warm."

It is understood that if the Woodman of the World had decided to build at Thirtieth and Farnam streets, the Omaha National bank would not have gone on with its purchase of the New York Life, but would have taken quarters in the new Woodman building.

But now that the Woodman have about closed their purchase of the Sixteenth and Jackson corner the Millard bank has concluded to buy the Life building.

There is another feature of the Woodman proposition that comes up in this connection. It is said that the bankers—those of the Merchants, Omaha, First and Nebraska nationals—in the vicinity of Thirtieth and Farnam had agreed to make up a bonus, equal to the difference in prices of the Jackson and Farnam street sites if the Woodman would take the latter. But this, too, fell through.

Omaha Woman in Line for Fortune. Mrs. Rose Morton Believes She is Heir to Sixty Millions of English Property.

Mrs. Rose Morton is awaiting word from London to find out if Charles Morrison, an English uncle, left a will disposing of his \$60,000,000 property.

Morrison was eccentric and unmarried, and when he died it is believed he made no testament.

Mrs. Morton, who lives in Omaha at the residence of George H. Rowland in Dundee, is one of several heirs-at-law and will get part of the money in case it is not all willed away. W. W. Sibahugh, her attorney, has written to the London offices where all the wills left in England are filed, to get the facts. The certainty of Mrs. Morton's relationship to the deceased capitalist is fairly well established. Her name formerly was Rose Morrison.
