FATHER SEEKS TO SECURE CHILD
Insists Grandparents are Not Suitable Guardians.

Gust Emten of Chicago, formerly employed as a cook at the Henshaw hotel in Omaha, has instituted proceedings before Judge Snyder of the superior court to secure the custody of his daughter, Ruth Emten, aged 18 years, who since the death of her mother, has been living with her grandmother, Mrs. S. A. Peterson of East Omaha, but who until a year ago resided in South Omaha.

The mother of the child died about six years ago in St. Bernard's hospital in this city. Emten, about three years ago, just before his removal to Chicago, married again. In his information filed yesterday Emten charged that the grand parents were unfit persons to have the custody of the little girl, and alleged that they were in the habit of drinking to excess and that they frequently gave the child liquor.

P. S. McAuley, trustee officer at South Omaha, testified that he had made an investigation about a year ago and had learned that the grand parents were in the habit of giving beer to the little girl. Steps were about to be taken to remove the child from the grand parents' home, but before the papers could be served Mr. and Mrs. Peterson removed to East Omaha in Iowa territory.

The hearing was continued until Monday and pending a final order in the case the child was retained in the care of her mother, Mrs. R. E. Furry, with whom Mr. and Mrs. Peterson now make their home. Mrs. Furry's husband is foreman of the ice house in East Omaha.
