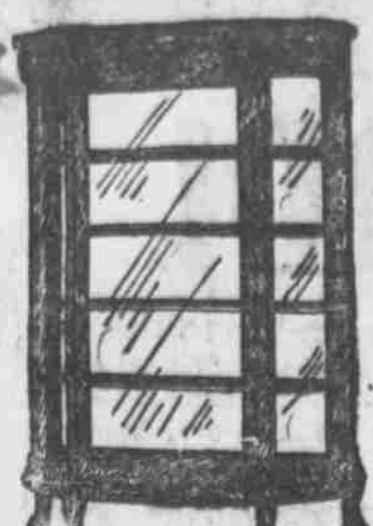
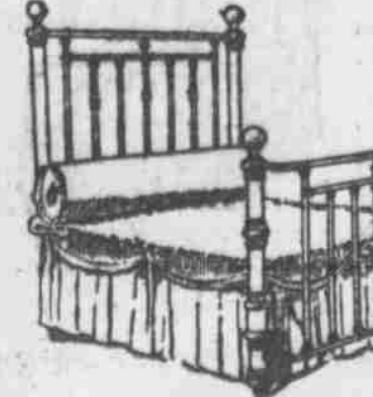

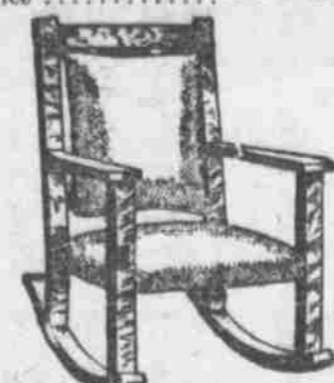

Cabinet Declines To Arbitrate Labor Dispute

Swedish Government Returns Show that Over Two Hundred Thousand Are Still on Strike.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 28.—At a cabinet meeting today it was decided to refuse to arbitrate the labor disputes which resulted in the general strike. The governor has issued a proclamation notifying all employers who desire protection for nonunion labor that they will be supplied with police and military guards. Nine hundred extra policemen have been appointed for this purpose.

The Salvation Army says that the suffering in the homes of the laborers who went on strike is pitiable. Many of the men have pawned most of their belongings and their families are either without food or subsisting on one meager meal daily. They also fear that the landlords will turn them out because of back pay in the rent. The strikers do not dare appeal to the poor relief fund, but are applying to the Salvation Army, which is preventing actual starvation.
