CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Hot weather in the west and southwest had a tendency to offset liberal receipts of wheat in the north-west and caused a fairly steady tone in the wheat market here today.

Although the wheat market was inclined to be weak almost all day, no decided weakness was manifested at any time and at the close prices were steady to one cent higher than Saturday's final figures.

Corn held fairly steady and a surprise, as traders were bearish on heavier receipts and large estimates for tomorrow.

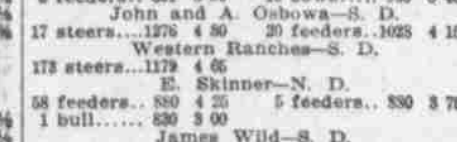
