

Mr. Pratt then said that, while he and Mr. Wattles were not far apart on matters of substance, what he wanted was a contract rather than a statement from the captured first prize for wall scaling, ~A H. Buckley who died immediately after the company. His proposed contract was then examined in detail, and he stated that if it were entered into it would be signed by certain officers of the union. He was asked to point out any promise or agreement

contained in the proposed contract to be performed by any one except the Street Railway company, and he admitted that there was no such promise in the proposed agreement.

The controversy thus narrowed down, for mmediate purposes, to whether, all of the promises and agreements being on one side, the document to be signed should be in the form of a written declaration by the company to all of its employes or in the form of a contract with the union thereby ignoring the non-union workman. As the making of such a contract would be a breach of faith on the part of the Street Railway company toward its nonunion employes, and as the demand for it was a breach of the promise of the union made at the time the union employes were reinstated in their employment it was unanimously resolved by the executive committee of the Business Men's associaion that the association approve the attitude of the Street Ballway company, and would give that company its support in the event that a strike should be prein the event that a strike should be pre-cipitated. This action of the committee was afterwards unanimously endorsed by a general meeting of the association on Sunday afternoon. Upon the conclusion of the greentive cipitatod.




