South Dakota Property Value

Increase of Thirty-Six Million Dollars is Shown by the Assessment of Last Year.

PIERRE, S. D., Sept. 23.-(Special.)-The total assessed valuation of all property in the state for this year as shown by the forthcoming report of the state auditor will be \$320,087,258, an increase of little over \$36,000,000 over the assessment of last year. Of this increase about \$2,500,000 has been placed against corporate property and the balance against real estate and personal property. The corporate property valuation this year is over \$32,000,000 and that of farm lands alone is \$139,199,077 While the state shows up well with farm property, the assessors could find but \$52,000 worth of watches, diamonds and jewelry, or about state. And while the banks show individual deposits of nearly \$60,000,000, the assessable amount of money is less than \$1,000,000. The matter of household goods does not make any great showing, with only a little over planes come up to very near the million mark, and with organs added the musical instruments are just about equal to the ousehold goods in assessable value. The banks are assessed at \$3,200,617 and there is but about \$4,000 of the capital stock of insurance companies held in the state, if the figures of the assessor are to be taken as correct. The horses of the state are valued at about \$15,000,000, while cattle are at a little less than a million and swine
