Brewers Appeal to the Retailers

Ask Them to Be Careful and Observe All the Provisions of the Law.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Oct. 1.-(Special Telegram.)-At a conference of leading brewers of lowa held in this city it was decided that each brewer of the state should address letters to his agents and customers enjoining them to strictly live up to all the provisions of the liquor laws and especially the Moon and Bennett laws. Attorney Guernsey of this city subsequently dictated a statement for publication saying the action was in the hope of raising the tone of the liquor business in the state and that it was believed that by preventing irresponsible persons from opening saloons criticism against the business would be
