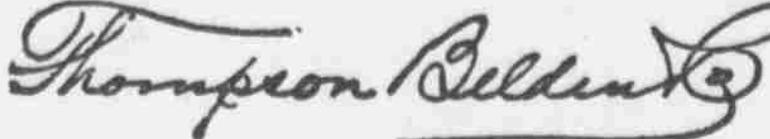

MIXER WINS BIG BALLOON RACE

(Continued from First Page.)

Each of the pilots was provided at Zurich with a special Russian passport guaranteed by the Russian minister to Switzerland to protect them against annoyance. The American embassy at St. Petersburg has been advised of Mixer's predicament and asked to take the matter up at once with the Russian authorities.

Orders Received of Mix.
ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 6.—When the news that the American balloonist, Edgar W. Mixer, under arrest at Ostrolenka, north of Warsaw, was communicated to Premier Stolypin at his country estate this afternoon, the premier promised to expedite his release.

Geneva, Switzerland, Oct. 6.—Prize for Edgar W. Mixer's victory is heard on all sides, the winner of the international balloon race being extremely popular in Swiss aeronautic circles. The American victories in aeroplaning and ballooning are the subject of comment. Prior to the start the Swiss aviators recall Mixer when asked about his chances of winning said: "Every balloon has a good chance. The America will try its utmost and I think we will win."

St. Louis Balloon in Lead.
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6.—Unless the balloon Centennial (H. E. Honeywell, pilot), which was last reported at Livingston, Ala., 400 miles from St. Louis, at 11 o'clock this morning, has exceeded 500 miles, the balloon St. Louis No. 2 (S. L. Von Puhl, pilot), which landed this morning at Wahkon, Minn., 500 miles from St. Louis, has won the race which began here Monday afternoon. Von Puhl, if he registered for the St. Louis cup, also the coveted prize, the Puhl was in the air forty-one hours and thirty-five minutes.

The New York Harmon and Post, pilot and aide, telegraphed tonight that they landed at Edina, Mo., 148 miles from here, after a trip fraught with disappointments. The aeronauts, in the most expensive and best equipped gas bag, traveled over Illinois, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Missouri, and then had to alight north of the starting point. The New York was in the air forty-eight hours and forty-five minutes.

The Indiana, which sailed under protest, because H. H. McGill had no license, dropped to the ground near Albany, Minn., 500 miles from St. Louis, after an exciting trip. McGill left here in a hammock in the basket because of an injury he received at the aerodrome.

Houston (disqualified), Dr. Crum and Gustaf, near Russellville, Mo., at 11:20 a. m. Tuesday. Distance, 122 miles.
University City, Berry and Fox, near Moberly, Mo., at 11:30 p. m. Tuesday. In the air twenty-one hours and fifty-five minutes. Distance, 204 miles.
Pomona, Archer and Taylor, near Knobel, Ark., at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday. In the air twenty-four hours and thirty minutes. Attained height of 66 feet. Distance, 122 miles.
Cleveland, Wade and Morgan, near Alexandria, Va., at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday. In the air thirty-nine hours and forty-five minutes. Distance, 44 miles.

Land Seekers Are Coming In
Special Rates on the Railroads Bring People from Considerable Distances.
PIERRE, S. D., Oct. 6.—(Special Telegram.)—The registration today is showing a decided increase on account of special excursion trains bringing people from out of the state. Most of the registration today was from Iowa, Nebraska and Minnesota points, and tomorrow will bring those from farther eastern states. The registration here for the day is already over 1,000 and more coming.

Self-Restraint in Game.

president's party at San Francisco this morning and will presently explain the wonders of the park to the valley to Mr. Taft. The Yosemite region was ceded by the state of California to the United States and now is under the same control as the Yellowstone.
The president visited the Yellowstone several years ago and during his present tour is adding the Yosemite and the Grand Canyon in Arizona, to the long list of the world's wonders it has been his good fortune to see.
Mr. Taft will be accompanied into the

big tree grove and into the park only by members of his own party and a California delegation consisting of Governor Gillett, Senator Flint and Representatives Needham, McKinley and Englebright.
Rain Lays the Dust.
When the date of the president's visit to the park was fixed there was great fear that his trip might be seriously marred by the suffocating dust which sometimes is encountered on the way in and out during the dry seasons of the year. Rains during the last ten days, however, have fortunately served to put the roads in the best of condition and also to provide a new supply of water for the falls, which at this season have but small semblance to the rushing, pitching cataracts of the spring.
The ride into El Portal this afternoon

furnished a foretaste of scenery that next three days have in store for the president. Leaving Merced at 3:30 p. m., after an uneventful run down the famous San Joaquin valley, the president's train began an eighty-mile run to the terminus of the Yosemite Valley railroad at this place. For more than three-fourths of the way the train would along the Merced river with its series of waterfalls, and kept continually climbing from the level of the sea to the height of more than 4,000 feet. The president made several car-end speeches at thriving little California cities between San Francisco and Merced, and at the latter place was escorted to the court house, where he made a brief address to a big throng. All business in the town was suspended while the president was there.
