

NEW THEATER ON DOUGLAS

Morris Vaudeville House Will Stand on Corner of Eighteenth.

BUTS LOTS FROM BRANDEISES

Walter H. Seely, Manager, Says Operations for Fireproof Building to Be Done February 1 Will Start Soon.

The new William Morris theater building will be located at the northeast corner of Eighteenth and Douglas streets, the old Hanson homestead, according to an announcement made by Walter H. Seely, vice president and general manager of the western corporation of the company.

Mr. Seely Thursday morning closed a deal with J. L. Brandeis & Sons for the old Hanson property. "We will begin moving the houses Monday," said Mr. Seely and the work of excavating will start within a few days. We expect to be in the building by February 1.

The price paid for the lot is said to be close to \$100,000. Mr. Seely said the total investment of his company would amount to about \$250,000. It is the intention to cut the terrace down and bring the theater entrance to street level.

Insane Sleep on the Floor at County Hospital

Forced To, Says Elsass, Because There is No Room Anywhere Else for Them.

With insane patients at the county hospital forced to sleep on mattresses laid on the floor, with the superintendent of the state hospital at Lincoln declining to receive a patient because he has no room, Douglas county has now a good illustration of the immediate need of some provision for the care of its insane.

Bertha Wickes, a middle-aged woman picked up by the police on the streets, is lying on the county jail strapped and bound because of her violence. She has been arrested on an insanity charge and her case awaits treatment, but there is no place to send her. Superintendent Woodward of the Lincoln hospital was called by phone by District Court Clerk Robert Smith and Woodward replied that she simply did not have room and must refuse her.

G. Fred Elsass, superintendent of the Douglas County hospital, is authority for the statement that insane patients, though not of the violent kind, must perforce sleep on the floor, because of the almost total lack of facilities. Violent patients for whom there are but one or two rooms, have to be attended by regular staff physicians and nurses who can ill afford taking the time from other inmates of the hospital.

The Board of County Commissioners realizes that something must be done and that it ought to be done at once, but has no definite plan.

"We shall take some steps at once," said P. J. Trainor, "for we realize the urgent necessity. Douglas county must provide a hospital for its insane and must provide it at once."
