Sixth Iowa cavairy, the Second Nebraska cavalry and a company that was raised ear Sioux City, Ia. The Sixth Iowa was led by Lieutenant Colonel Pollock, who had Indian blood in his veins. Colonel Furnas commanded the Second Nebraska and General Sully was in supreme command. There was also a battery of four 12-pound guns commanded by Lieutenant Krunic of lowa The Sloux Indians were the same that butchered the inhabitants of New Ulm, Minn., in the same year, and were led by that blood-thirsty warrior, Chief Little

The expedition left Sloux City, and journeyed up the Missouri river to the mouth of Crow creek, where it stayed several weeks. From there the troops moved to the mouth of Cheyenne river and there went across land toward Devil's lake. At Devil's lake instructions were sent to move on to Fort Pierre, S. D., where it was said the Indians were in force. Upon arriving at Fort Pierre, the services of a guide named Frank Frinnboise were secured. but the man who proved to be the real guide was a full-blooded Sloux Indian: called Fool Dog. The companies then moved on in light marching order, did not carry much but rations and ammunition and one blanket for each man and tents. During the march the weather at times was bitter cold and one flerce hallstorm swept over the cavalry. When the Jim river was reached the buffalo country was entered and there the first Indian signs were seen. It seemed that here were millions of buffalo, so the survivors say, and all along at this point were seen carcasses of buffalo, which had been killed and stripped by the Indians.

Reward Offered Scouts.

In the meantime a reward had been offered to the scout first sighting the In dians in force. Camp had been pitched at noon on the 3d, when a scout galloped in rushed to headquarters, and in an instant Dakota Pastors the bugle sounded, "boots and saddle," and in just eighteen minutes the troops were in line, excepting one battalion which was left with the train. General Sully rode down the line. It was a saying among his men. "When the iron grey comes out look for trouble," He said: "Boys you did it well. Fours to the right."

The troops were soon on a run and the twenty-fifth annual conference of the distance of tweive miles to the Indian camp whites, and at one time it seemed as if amid a perfect rain of arrows and fierce carrying tomahawks. The battery did fierce execution, which finally caused the Indians to break and run, followed by the fire of the soldiers and the battery, which killed many Indians and horses. The troops followed the fleeing warriors, who scattered in all directions, but were unable to do much as darkness had fallen. While the troops were in pursuit some of the reciskins returned and carried off some of the dead and wounded soldiers, as well as many of their own numbers.
