CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Wheat fell off today, the bearish sentiment being marked through the entire session, aithough a slight recovery kept the market from closing on the low point of the day. December ranged 15c lower and closed to below yesperday's figures, and a similar condition was shown in May. Corn and oats, governed by the overshadowing wheat market, ruled lower, and provisions, with the exception of immediate products, dropped in price.

Large realizing sales by heavy holders pounded the wheat market, and no support was found in the cables. Cash sales to iniliers, although totaling a large amount, did not hold the market, nor did tidings that Minneapolis wheat in store today totaled 2400,000 bu., compared with 19,000,000 bu., a year ago.
