Teachers Must Ascertain Cause of Absence and in Case of Contagious Disease, Cannot Be Readmitted Without Certificate.

At a special meeting of the Board of Education, held yesterday morning, following the closing of the Bloomer school Friday on account of several cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever among the pupils, the following rules, designated to prevent the spread of contagious diseases in the schools of the city, were adopted.

Rules to Prevent Contagion.

Resolved. That the following rules be adopted by the Board of Education of the lity of Council Bluffs:
That in every case of absence the princi-

pal shall at once ascertain whether the same is on account of lliness and shall also ascertain the nature of the disease and the name of the attending physician. This shall at once be reported to the

That in all cases where a child is absent because of sickness and no attending physician is employed, such child may be readmitted upon the filing of a statement showing the nature of the disease with the secretary of the Board of Education and upon action by the board. In all such cases an investigation shall be made by the truant officer and the Board of Education shall have authority to direct an examination by a physician of its selection. The superintendent shall have authority in such case to direct the readmission of such child or children pending the action of the board.
