Work of Getting Jury for Basin Murder Trials

Examination of Venire of Eighty-Six Men Will Begin This Morning at Nine O'clock.

BASIN, Wyo., Nov. 4 .- (Special Telegram.)-Out of a venire of 100 men summoned to serve at this term of court in Big Horn county and in which the cases of the cattlemen come up for hearing, eighty-six were found qualified to serve as jurors. The examination of these men will begin at nine o'clock Thursday morning. Counsel for defense secured an order from the court requiring the defense to endorse on the informations filed against the cattlemen the names of all the bonafide witnesses that are to testify against the accused.
