DAIRYMEN MUST DO BETTER WORK

Inspector Peter Smith Makes port on Twenty-Five of Them.

Peter Smith, city health inspector, has reported on twenty-five dairies which he has inspected as provided by the new purmilk ordinance. Inspector Smith bases his findings on gradings for equipment and methods. Perfect equipment counts forty points, while perfect methods score sixty points. The highest score any dairy se-FAUST BEER AT ROGERS BUFFET, cured in seventy-eight points, or twentytwo short of "perfect." The ordinance requires that to be eligible for a license dairy must secure at least forty-nine points. Smith's report shows that three of the dairies inspected by him fell below the reguired standard,

Inspector Smith expressed the opinion that the result of his inspection would be that the dairymen who failed to score the requisite number of points and those who fell far below the "perfect" total would at once take steps to remedy the defects complained of so that by the time he made an-. Good other round their places would score up to the required standard.
