

CRITICISM OF DENVER GAME

Cornhusker Management Criticized for Playing Professionals.

SOME SORE ON RECENT DEFEAT

Lincoln Poor Patron of Foot Ball Until This Season, When Turnout Has Exceeded Expectations of Athletic Men.

LINCOLN, Nov. 10.—(Special.)—The Nebraska foot ball management is being criticized in some quarters for having scheduled a game with Denver university, and one of the local papers is demanding the resignation of both "King" Cole and Manager Earl O. Eager on the grounds that these men have proved themselves incompetent to conduct Cornhusker foot ball.

There is no denying that Denver is not regarded as a strict slightly power as the other Colorado schools, or as an rival of the colleges in this section, but the Nebraska management, for financial and other reasons, was forced to give the Minutemen a game this season, and the booking of the contest was sanctioned by the Nebraska Board of Control.

Lincoln has been a poor patron of Cornhusker athletics until this fall, and it has been necessary to play "big" games away from home, at Omaha and other cities, in order to make the sports pay. Denver, for two years, had been demanding a game from the Cornhuskers, and had been constantly refused one. Even this fall the western team's request would have been denied but the local management and Ames could not agree on terms and Denver was taken on to fill out the local schedule.

Denoch Koehler, who is a former University of Nebraska player, declares his eleven is above professional this fall, though admitting things were not exactly chaste last season. The criticism of the Cornhuskers for the Denver game will probably lead them to refuse to play any but conference games.

Local Sports Are Sore.

Local athletic men think the criticism of the foot ball management has been inspired by local sports who are "sore" because the Cornhuskers failed to defeat Kansas. It is thought these critics will take a pleasant view of the situation if the Cornhuskers should whip the undefeated Denver eleven.

The demand for the resignation of Coach Cole and Manager Eager is not likely to bear fruit just now. These two men are popular with the students and probably will be retained for at least another year.

Much interest is being manifested in the annual game between the teams from the Lincoln and Omaha high schools, which is scheduled to take place on Nebraska field Saturday afternoon.

There is no Cornhusker game on that day and the entire school will give attention to the interscholastic players. The game is expected to be a hard fight, with each favoring the Omaha men. University students are arranging a banquet for the Omaha visitors. Special plans are being laid to take care of the Omaha people in a night-sitting four Saturday morning. A theater party will be on the program for Saturday evening. The ticket sale for the game has been exceedingly large and the largest crowd that ever saw a high school game in this city is expected.

ACTION ON COAST LEAGUE

New California Circuit Comes Before Minor League Association.

MAY REDISTRIBUTE SOME LEAGUES

Several Circuits May Be Changed After 1911—New Classification to Be Made After Next Census.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 10.—The National Association of Minor Leagues held its second session today and considered several questions of importance. The principal business was the action on the ratification of the agreement brought by Secretary Farrell of the National association and Frank Hermann, president of the California State league, concerning the admission of the former "outlaw" league, which has been approved by the National Board of Arbitration. As that agreement stands now it is almost certain it will be ratified by the National association.

The national board again went into session, as it has nearly 300 cases to dispose of in a short time. Most of these cases are of minor importance and are of interest only to those concerned.

A committee to look into the advisability of redistributing the territory of certain leagues is to be appointed by President M. H. Sexton today. The arranging of the circuits of the Three I league and Central association, the Ohio and Pennsylvania, Ohio State and Central leagues and American and Western associations is contemplated, but these changes are made they will probably not go into effect until 1911. A complete reclassification of the National association is expected, but no definite action will be taken on that subject until after the census of 1910 is taken, as this classification depends upon population of the cities in each league.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Frank Gotch, champion wrestler of the world, defeated Giovanni Balcevic of Italy, in two straight falls in a match which was the first in 16 minutes 25 seconds and the second in 5 minutes and 25 seconds.

Gotch won the first fall with a crotch and arm hold. The Italian, who is a fine exhibition of wrestling skill, but the champion was too agile and strong for Balcevic to succeed in his tactics. Balcevic resisted it successfully, the crowd thought the challenge to the world's champion was being made.
