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WOMAN MAKES THREAT TO PUBLISH THOSE EPISTLES

Mrs. Stewart Comes Forward with a New Sensation in the Case of Warriner. CINCINNATI, Nov. 1.—While maintaining that \$64,000 is the maximum of the shortage charged against Charles I. Warriner, deposed local treasurer of the Big Four railroad in this city, it is known that the railroad officials are continuing their investigation.

A report that at least one high official on the local end of the Big Four had tendered his resignation as a result of the Warriner disclosures went the rounds of railroad circles early today, but no confirmation of the rumor could be had. At the Big Four office, a dozen expert accountants were engaged in checking over Warriner's books, and those in charge declared there was nothing additional to give out today which would add to the information heretofore made public in statements issued in this city and the New York Central office in the east.

Mrs. Jeannette Stewart, or Mrs. Ford, as she is also known, whose presence in this city was disclosed yesterday through an attachment taken out against the furnishings in her apartments, gave out an additional statement today in which she promised some interesting developments in connection with the Warriner case. Locked in a safety deposit box under her name, Mrs. Stewart declares she holds letters from the Chicago man who has been named as one of the blackmailers of Warriner, and these letters she declares will make public at the proper time. "The letters he refers to as his 'trump card'," she says, "were pressed the 10th day, she said today, 'and I intend to do my utmost to hold these letters and when I make them public they'll make those around the Big Four office sit up and take notice.' " "Why don't they arrest me if they think I've taken blackmail money? Those letters will show they don't arrest me," Mrs. Stewart claims that all of the others implicated in the case have agreed to throw all the burden on her. "And I won't stand it," she said. "I've tried to keep out of this, but they won't let me. I only hope they let me go before the grand jury. They are trying to do me in."

Later yesterday Mrs. Stewart called on Mrs. Charles Warriner at the Warriner home in Wyoming. They had an extended conversation over the phone. Mrs. Stewart said in reply to the Warriner home verified the fact that a conversation was had with Mrs. Stewart. Mrs. Warriner, however, declined to go into details.

Bennett was successful in raising the \$100 from relatives and came to Omaha Wednesday to deliver the money. Upon arriving he turned the money over to Mammie for safe keeping and arranged to meet her at the court house Thursday morning to have the nuptial knot tied. When it still was waiting.
