State Bar Association Will Hold Annual Meeting in Omaha.

JAMES R. GARFIELD TO SPEAK

Hot Debate Likely Over Question of Reforming Practice Along Line Favored by President Taft in Address.

Lawyers tall and lawyers short, office lawyers, corporation lawyers, attorneys who devote themselves to criminal practice, patent lawyers, constitutional lawyers, lawyers who are little else than administrators of estates, and lawyers who are not much except at befogging juries, every variety of legal limb—except of course patifoggers and shysters—will assemble in Omaha December 25 and 26.

Francis A. Brogan, president of the Nebraska State Bar association, announces that the organization will meet here on those dates, which have been selected because there are no courts in session at that time.

James R. Garfield, formerly secretary of the Interior, and one of the distinguished presidents, will be here to deliver the principal address. Other papers will be presented by the officers of the association and its members, who are either in practice or connected with the faculty of the two law schools of Nebraska.

"We are going to have a real meeting and not a perfunctory one," said President Brogan, "and there will be some live questions in which the public is much interested. The attendance will, I am sure, be large, and there will be at least 500 lawyers present."
