Setting is Again Nebraska at Colorado Capital.

'FARD' WOLCOTT OUT OF GAME

Coacher Right Guard Laid Up with Tonillita-Captain Volk

Back for First Time Since Injury.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 19.—(Special Telegram)—On the eve of the football eleven of the University of Nebraska and Denver the Cornhuskers' chances of winning the game were lessened considerably when "King" Cole announced that "Fard" Wolcott, right guard, would not be able to take his place in the Nebraska lineup tonight.

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Coach Cole refused to make any prediction on the game, but said the outlook for his eleven was not very bright.

The weather indications tonight point to a fair, warm day tomorrow.

At practice this afternoon the Cornhuskers became so warm that they removed all but a few light garments.

None of the Nebraska players has been affected by the high altitude and it is thought they will not notice the change from their lower altitudes.

YALE AND HARVARD REST

Rival Foot Ball Teams Go Into Seclusion for Two Days.

CROWDS BEGINNING TO ARRIVE

Indications that All of the 38,000 Seats in the Stadium Will Be Taken—Men Are in Pair Shape.

Cambridge, Nov. 19.—The rival foot ball teams of Harvard and Yale rested quietly last night some miles from the scene of Saturday's encounter with their hard training days behind them and their championship honors still to be gained.

Within the walls of the Stadium are seats for 38,000 persons, many of whom are expected to be present for the finest exhibition of modern foot ball ever played on an American gridiron.

The custom of sending the two teams into comparative seclusion forty-eight hours before the game, was pursued today.

The Harvard team, led by Captain Fish, was given an enthusiastic send off from college this afternoon.

Neither is Yale free from an injured list as the right end position was said tonight to be still in doubt.

Yale still held the favorite position in the betting today, although the odds, which earlier in the month stood 5 to 3, have scaled to 5 to 4.

Chili Claim May Go to Hague

Government Opens Negotiations with View to Submitting the Dispute.

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 19.—The Chilean government today opened negotiations with Washington with a view to submitting the Alsop claim to a specially constituted court of arbitration at The Hague.

Great anxiety is felt here because of the notification through Chilean Minister Cruz at Washington that the United States will close its legation at Santiago within a few days unless the Chilean government consent to an adjustment of the Alsop claim or agrees to refer the dispute to The Hague.

The members of the American colony here protest that the manner in which the United States is proceeding is arbitrary and detrimental to American interests in Chile.

Pinchot Lauds Farm Life

Chief Forester Declares It Important to Increase Proportion of Country People.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Delegates to the National Farm Land congress, in session here today, listened to a letter from Gifford H. Pinchot, chief forester.

"There can be few patriotic duties more important than to promote the development and proper handling of all the farm lands of the United States," says the letter.

He also emphasized the necessity of increasing the attractiveness of life.

Hose Cart Drops Fifty Feet
