

CUT IN NATIONAL BUDGET

Estimate of Expense \$103,370,303 Lower Than for Last Year.

FIGURES ARE REPORTED TO HOUSE

Bednetion is Partly Due to Order of President Taft that Padding Blust Stop-Total Amount Asked \$732,228,075.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 .- That there has been a careful scrutiny of the estimates of the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 28, 1911, is shown by the Treasury MacVeagh.

The grand total of estimates for illi, is \$753,223,078, which is \$103.870.305 less than the appropriations for the current fiscal year and \$123,050.493 under the estimates submitted a year ago for 1916. A general cut has been made wherever possible and new work authorized only where regarded as absolutely necessary.

Heretofore it has been the practice of departmental officers to "pad" the estimates with the expectation that they would be muterially reduced before being finally

As soon as President Taft came into of fice he directed that this practice be discontinued and gave notice to the members' of his cabinet that in the future all estimates must be submitted on the basis of the actual needs and regulrements of the

The result is, the officials say, that the figures submitted today are down to bedrook and will beer the closest examination by the appropriation committees of both houses of congress. Reductions in Estimates.

Large reductions in the estimates are contemplated with the appropriations for the future.

In the Treasury department a decrease of \$12,000,000 for public works; in the War department about \$6,000,000 in the military and establishment, made up of decreases in the estimates for regular supplies, construction works for the army, mounted equipment, transportation, ordnance and manufacture of arms, and \$2,500,000 for public works, exclusive of the Panama

In the Navy department decrease of \$26. 600,600, due partly to the fact that Secretary Meyer has not asked for any money for new ships and that only \$4,600,000 is requested for armor and armament as against an appropriation of \$13,452,000 for

In the Postoffice department a reduction of \$5,000,000 in the estimated deficiency in the postal revenues; and in the Department of Commerce and Labor a decrease from \$10,660,660 to \$2,600,000 on account of the thirteenth census.




