## Reorganization of Rock Island is Completed

Four Vice Presidents Chosen to Have Charge of Operation, Traffic and Purchases.

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—Reorganization of the Rock Island railroad was practically completed today by the election of four new vice presidents to serve with President Henry T. Mudge. The following changes were announced: James E. German, formerly freight traffic manager of the Santa Fe, to be first vice president in charge of the freight traffic, succeeding W. F. Biddle; F. O. Melcher to be second vice president in charge of operation, succeeding H. T. Mudge; John Sebastian, formerly passenger traffic manager, to be third vice president in charge of passenger traffic; E. S. Moore, formerly second assistant to the president, to be fourth vice president in charge of purchases, succeeding E. L. Follock.

## MARLEY CASE BEFORE COURT

LOGAN, Ia., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The preliminary hearing of Henry Marley, Guy Marley and Ira Brundridge, led for the alleged offense of an assault upon Mrs. Marley with intent to commit murder, was postponed this morning until December 28. The three men are now in jail at Logan. Guy Marley, accused by Mrs. Marley, came from Dow City Thursday last with a supply of whisky, and after the three men were well under the influence of the liquor, they proceeded to smash up the household furniture, and when the steppen began on the woman, Marley, who alleged her stepson that he caught the shotgun and fired the shot that struck her in the arm and shoulder and almost severed the arm from the body. With her arm hanging by a few shreds of flesh, she fled to a neighbor's, where a surgeon was called and her arm amputated, and the officers notified at both Logan and Missouri Valley.

Henry Marley and Ira Brundridge admit they heard the shot fired, but affirm that they were not in the room when the shooting occurred, and consequently did not see who shot Mrs. Marley. Though Guy Marley, the steppen, told the officers of Missouri Valley when first arrested and Censable Packenough when brought to Logan, that he knew absolutely nothing about the shooting, he has since admitted to Sheriff Rock and Attorney Smith that a shotgun was accidentally discharged while in his hands Thursday afternoon, but he emphatically asserts that his stepmother was neither harmed nor in sight when the accident occurred.

Notwithstanding the alleged innocence on the part of the three men in jail, Sheriff Rock and Attorney Smith, after a personal investigation, say that Mrs. Marley's story is corroborated in that the household furniture and dishes are not only broken to pieces in the Marley house, but that the wall of the house is still splattered with blood and shreds of flesh, and torn pieces of clothing and punctured with shot evidently fired at close range, as asserted by Mrs. Marley.

It is also alleged that Mr. Marley is a man by trade, but that he spends his earnings in dissipation and that his wife has for some time supported the family at hard work, over the wages she and the children have often been compelled to take and go to the neighbors for protection.

## GOVERNOR REFUSES TO REINSTATE SHERIFF

Calto, Ill., Officer Who Failed to Protect Prisoner From Mob Forfeits His Office.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 6.—Late tonight Governor Deneen denied the petition of Frank E. Davis for reinstatement as sheriff of Alexander county. It was Sheriff Davis, whom the Cairo, Ill., mob took William James, colored, and Henry Salner, white, and lynched them on the night of November 11 last. After reviewing the opening in detail, the governor, in a voluminous statement, submits evidence that Sheriff Davis did not do all in his power to protect the prisoners and made no forcible resistance, and on this ground the petition for reinstatement is denied.

## SCHOOL BONDS BOUGHT HERE

Deal with Bankers Reserve Life Company Ratified—New Lots Purchased.

The Board of Education last evening adopted the recommendation of the committee on finance and claims awarding the sale of the \$100,000 school bonds to the Bankers Reserve Life company at a premium of \$3.50, that company being the best bidder. In recommendation of the committee on supplies and buildings it was agreed to buy the property at the northeast corner of Twenty-first and Nicholas streets, 7x170 feet, for \$2,750, and to accept the proposition of the owners of the property of 2000 for two buildings now standing. It is proposed to build here a suitable structure for the storage of miscellaneous school property. It was reported that a considerable quantity of coal now being delivered to some of the school buildings is not up to the contract standard. The matter was referred to the supplies and finance committees.

## EUROPEANS SENDING MONEY HOME FOR CHRISTMAS TIME

Nearly Four Hundred Orders Mailed First Five Days in December at Local Postoffice.

The money-order department of the Omaha postoffice is doing a bustling business issuing and sending money order to foreign lands as Christmas remembrances. During the first five days of December, 243 have been sent, amounting to about \$7,000, against 224 orders for the corresponding first five days of December, 1908.

## Woman's Work

Activities of the Organized Bodies Along the Lines of Undertaking of Concern to Women.

Rev. B. Fay Mills talked of prison conditions before the industrial conference of the Woman's club Monday afternoon and advocated a number of theories which, he said, have been successfully worked out in other states. Mr. Mills especially advocated the parole system and expressed the opinion that in a few years it would take many convicts out of the penitentiaries of the country. He believes in the "golden rule" system employed in some of the eastern cities and advocates kindness as a substitute for brutality and general inefficiency, which he claims is the general order among jail and prison attendants. He especially criticized the prison chaplains as superannuated, inefficient and even insincere, and advocated that many energetic men be placed in that office and not persons who had a "pull" and needed the position. He also criticized the lack of employment of the useless trades taught prisoners as a rule, and advocated that they be taught some useful trade that they might turn to account when they were discharged.

Mrs. Charles McDonald was hostess of the December meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution Monday afternoon at her home, being assisted by Mrs. William Archibald Smith, Mrs. William Heller and Miss Edith Patrick. General Grenville M. Dodge of Council Bluffs was the speaker of the afternoon, giving a reminiscent talk of his experiences on the western plains. A musical program was given by Mrs. N. P. Dodge, Jr., who played a violin solo, Miss Edith Patrick contributing a piano solo and Miss Alice Winspear a vocal solo. Mrs. Montgomery and Mrs. Thomas McNeill of Council Bluffs were guests of the afternoon.

## Milk Ordinance Upheld by Troup

Another Step in the Movement for Pure Milk Gained, So Council Forces Affirm.

Efforts of fifty Omaha dairymen and milk dealers to defeat the milk-sales ordinance were knocked into the proverbial cooked hat by Judge Troup in district court. The court refused to grant the injunction prayed for by Anton Grohbeck and forty-nine other dairies against the city of Omaha and Health Commissioner Connell from enforcing the ordinance. Inasmuch as no proof was offered in the hearing of the case that Dr. Connell has a financial interest, as was charged, in a pasteurizing company, and because of the way the decision went, Dr. Connell's friends are hailing the ruling as a big personal victory for him, and as another step forward in the fight for pure milk in Omaha.

## SUES FOR LOSS OF HIS JOB

Man Discharged for Garnishment Wages Sues Company Bringing the Attachment.

A garnishment suit filed Samuel P. Justus his place with the Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway company and Justus is now suing in district court for \$3,000 damages. The H. B. Ridgley Merchandise company which brought the garnishment suit is the defendant. Justus asserts that the Ridgley company promised not to bring such proceedings against him, well knowing that if he were garnished, the street car company would discharge him.
