

AGENCY MOURNS RED CLOUD

Pine Ridge, Says E. J. Jarechoe, is Gloomy at His Death.

WILL HAVE STATUE TO HIM

Bill McCune, Who Knew Him Well, Says He Dejected English, Preferring to Speak Indian in Honor Hunting Ground.

George J. Jarechoe, of Pine Ridge agency is at the Mithants. Mr. Jarechoe has been connected with the Pine Ridge agency for over thirty years and knew the great Sioux chief, Red Cloud, intimately.

"Red Cloud was in all respects an Indian. He was almost the last type of a great warrior race. He was old, deaf and blind, but in his heart yet remained the traditions of the wrongs inflicted on his people by the whites. He died a poor man."

Bill McCune Knew Him. Colonel William McCune has known Red Cloud for many years and said of him: "Red Cloud was the greatest Indian of the nineteenth century. He was the last typical representative of the Indian of the west. He was the greatest chief of the Sioux nation. I knew him intimately and have had many talks with him through an interpreter. He was always an Indian. He hated the Indians' language, but he hated the white man and recognized him only as a conqueror."

APPEAL FOR THE BANDITS

Motion Will Be Filed to Carry the Case to United States Supreme Court.

Fiehrer, attorney for William Matthews, one of the convicted Overland limited bandits, will file his motion for an appeal to the United States circuit court of appeals Tuesday, with the hope of securing a rehearing in the case of his client. He was asked for an extension of sixty days to perfect the appeal. J. M. Macfarland will make a similar application in the case of Lawrence J. Golden, another of the convicted bandits.

Some Things You Want to Know

The American Congress—The Leaders of the Senate.

Some time during the present session of the senate machinery usually has been going on. The senate is ruled by a committee on the order of business, a committee not included in the official lists of the senate committee. It is ordinarily known as the "steering committee."

Senator Aldrich is the real leader of the senate. He considers policies of state and he is able usually to shape them to his liking. He is fortified by the possession of the four things most required in a senate leader: namely, the sympathy and increment of experience and seniority; ability to compel, persuade or command as the occasion demands; capacity for infinite labor and study; and, therefore, complete knowledge of any subject under discussion, and, lastly, the sympathy and confidence of those conservative forces which have been supreme in the American government for the last generation.

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NEBRASKA WITHDRAWN TO UNDERGO REPAIRS

Inquiry Under Way to Fix Responsibility for Recent Collision with Georgia.

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 13.—Rear Admiral Osterhaus, commanding the Second Fleet, is in the Atlantic fleet, presiding over the court of inquiry appointed by Rear Admiral Schroeder to investigate the collision which occurred between the battleships Georgia and Nebraska while maneuvering on the southern coast of Virginia, yesterday afternoon. The names of the other members of the court are not known here, naval officers positively refusing to discuss any phase of the collision.

GRIEF FOR MOSLEMS WHO ARE EXECUTED AT ADANA

Twenty-Six Pay Penalty and Thousands Witness Their Death for Lawless Acts.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 13.—Twenty-six Moslems were executed at Adana yesterday and today in connection with the April massacres. Great crowds witnessed the executions and the relatives of the condemned men, together with thousands of others, joined in the manifestations of grief.

Twelve-Year-Old Boy Struck by Union Pacific Train in Transfer Yards.

REINFORCED CONCRETE

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NEW LIQUOR SHIPPING RULE

Goods Must Bear Label Describing Their Character and Name of Consignee.

A new rule has just been promulgated by the internal revenue department requiring all liquor dealers shipping goods to put on the outside of the package labels describing the character of goods contained in the package and the correct name of the consignee. Any railroad company or express company delivering the goods to any other person than the consignee is liable to a fine of \$5,000.
