### QUIVEY TURNS 'EM ALL DOWN

Home Finder Won't Tell Mother Who Has Her Children.

### APPEALS TO POLICE FOR LIGHT

Officers of Law Are Denied All Information by Rev. E. P. Quivey as to Where Young Ones Are.

Mrs. Allen of Faulkner, Neb., seeks her children, who were adopted by the Nebraska Children's Home society, twelve years ago, when at the death of the father the family was left destitute. The anxious and yearning mother is pleading with the police to help her gain information, which, she says, is refused by officials of the society. Rev. E. P. Quivey, superintendent, she said, takes the position that it is not best for the welfare of the children and the interests of their foster parents to divulge to the mother their whereabouts. The father of the children died in May of 1897 and the children, Harry, 8 years of age, and Isabelle, 6 years of age, were taken from the mother, who was in straightened circumstances and placed with Rev. Mr. Quivey. The mother, upon receiving her health, which was broken at the time of her husband's death, endeavored to locate the children, and for a time Rev. Quivey would inform her by letter of their welfare, but absolutely refused any information as to where they had been placed. Late Mrs. Allen has been able to receive no replies to her numerous letters to Rev. Quivey and finally, in desperation, through Mrs. Ella Arndt, also of Faulkner, she appealed to the Omaha police. Emergency Officer Joe Hill, who looks after lost persons, visited Rev. Mr. Quivey and was met with a refusal. The only information obtainable was that it would be necessary for Mrs. Arndt to communicate direct with the society. According to the ages of the children given at the time of the father's death, Harry would now be 20 years of age, and Isabelle is years. Mrs. Arndt will be notified by the police to communicate with Rev. Mr. Quivey.

### DOES LEIDY FEAR THOMAS?

Anti-Saloon Superintendent Makes Quiet Investigation Himself.

### WHY ARE OLD CASES DROPPED?

He Sticks Probe into the Situation to Find Out if English and Thomas Have a Working Agreement.

Is there blood on the moon?  
The Anti-Saloon league through District Superintendent J. M. Leidy is out on an investigation. The league wishes to find out why Elmer E. Thomas its attorney, is active in the matter of prosecuting liquor dealers for violation of the laws up to the point where the county attorney has lodged information against alleged offenders and no further.

In other words, Rev. Mr. Leidy is inquiring what friendship exists between Thomas and County Attorney English by reason of which Thomas desists from complaining when the county attorney does not prosecute liquor cases after Thomas has undertaken the preliminary steps.

Mr. Leidy has now visited the office of the clerk of district court and obtained a list—a long one—of all the cases which have been begun, but not prosecuted for violation of liquor laws, for gambling and for selling liquors.

Among the cases on this list are those of thirty or more saloon men whose period of danger has almost elapsed.

In November of 1908 ten were procured in district court the indictments of about thirty-five saloon keepers and druggists for alleged violation of liquor laws, selling Sunday in most cases, and selling without a license in others. In addition, several informations were lodged charging gambling.

Of all these cases not one has been

ended except that of Lena Schwartz, accused of selling liquor Sunday, and of Rose Mann, whose case was nolle prossed.

The Schwartz woman made the mistake of voluntarily entering a plea of guilty. She paid a fine of \$100.

Elmer E. Thomas knows these prosecutions will expire if they continue over three terms of district court without prosecution.

Nor has Thomas forgotten that these informations stand on the records of the criminal branch of the district court of Douglas county. In fact, he was recently reminded of them.

The statute provides that cases may not be continued for more than three terms of district court. These informations were lodged in November during what is known as the October term of district court for the year 1908. Since then the February term of 1909 has passed, the May term has come by and the October term of this year—the third—is nearly gone.
