

DUNN HAS GARBAGE SCHEME

Says Only Way is to Let Job So Contractor Can Make Money.

Mayor Will Bear Brunt

"I am here to assume any responsibility that rests on me, or all the responsibility up to this very minute, if necessary," said Mayor Dahlman.

"I am a member of the special committee named to consider this matter," said the first ward councilman.

Councilman Berka said his resolution presented a way out, if a mandamus suit would lie, and called attention to his resolution, alluded to by the mayor.

Councilman McGovern called Guy L. Axtell to the floor and started a cross-examination that brought forth only a rebuff.

"Because the city does not protect us in our contract," he said.

"About every councilman present took a hand in the argument, Brucker got so far as to say that the contract now in existence is null and void."

Finally Assistant City Attorney Dunn got the floor, on invitation. He stated the mandamus, as proposed by Councilman Berka's resolution, would not work, and went further.

"You may amend this contract," said Dunn, "or give these people forty contracts, and you will still fail to have garbage and refuse removed unless the people doing it can make money out of the work."

We fought that matter out here for seven years and had dozens of suits, finally going to the supreme court and beating every ordinance. We defied injunction after injunction, and no man of the many arrested ever paid a dollar, and now you have exactly the same situation.

Dunn Outlines a Plan. Dunn then outlined what he believed could be done successfully.

"That thing," he said, "is to let the contractor for gathering garbage to men who have teams and want to employ them to

make a living. Advertisers and give the best bidders the various districts provided for by the ordinance now on file. Then provide a dump and let the garbage haulers take everything to that dump.

From Dunn's talk resulted the motion to favor the proposed districting ordinance from the file and consider it Monday.

Board Reaches Compromise with F. A. Broadwell

Gives Him \$1,200 for \$6,000 and Robert Smith Looks On with Regret.

The Board of County Commissioners has offered to compromise its \$6,000 claim against the services of F. A. Broadwell for \$1,200.

The suits against Broadwell are for money collected for services alleged as clerk of the Board of Insanity Commissioners.

Mr. Smith is deeply interested in the proposed compromise, for he has \$1,000 in uncashed warrants on hand made in his favor for services as clerk.

"I have not cashed them," said he, "for I wished to await an adjudication of the Broadwell matter."

"I cannot see how the board reached its decision. Either Broadwell is entitled to the whole \$6,000, or he is not entitled to a cent. If the board settles with me on the same basis, I shall be giving back 20 per cent approximately of the \$1,000 in warrants I have on hand."

NOW FOR THE POULTRY SHOW

Entries Coming In Rapidly for Transmississippi Association's Exhibit at End of the Year.
