

Condition of Normal School Funds is Good and Deficiency is Likely in Only One Fund.

LINCOLN, Jan. 1.—(Special.)—Secretary Ludden of the State Normal board filed his annual report of the finances of the two normal schools and of the board with the governor today. The report says that unless something unforeseen occurs the board will be able to complete the biennium within the appropriations made by the legislature, with the possible exception of the employees' wages fund at Peru. The appropriation for this purpose was \$200,000, less, the report says, than the actual payroll.
