Sensation Seen in Heinze Case Report Interesting Evidence Submitted to Grand Jury Will Be Made Known.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Hints that there would be sensational developments in the cases of the indicted United Copper company officials were thrown out today when counsel for F. Augustus Heinze entered a demurrer to the indictments against Heinze and gained the adjournment of a hearing on a charge involving other United Copper officials and directors.

HEINZE and his brother, Arthur P. F., were both in the United States circuit court when the cases came up. F. Augustus Heinze pleaded not guilty to an indictment charging him with embezzlement and misapplication of the funds of the Mercantile National bank, the former Mercantile National bank, the former Mercantile National bank and argument on the demurrer was set for January 13.

It was stated that the motion will be accompanied by allegations of unusual interest concerning acts and statements in the grand jury room when the indictments were found.

It is the charge of the prosecution that Mercantile bank funds were used in financing a pool in United Copper stocks and when the books of the United Copper company were written by the grand jury in its investigation they were found to have been split away.

OBJECTS TO SYNDICATE BALL Chairman August Herrmann Warns Club Owners Against This Evil. MURRAY CONTRACT IS REFERRED National Commission Declares It Has No Jurisdiction in the Matter—Outlaws Must Apply for Reinstatement.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 6.—A straight declaration against "syndicate base ball" in the report of August Herrmann, chairman of the national base ball commission, was the feature of the annual meeting here yesterday.

John C. Lynch, president of the National league, was guest of honor at a dinner given tonight by Chairman Herrmann and President Johnson of the American league.

William Murray's statement of his claim against the Philadelphia National league club was not made public. He asserted that he has a contract calling for his services as manager until after the season of 1911, but that the power management of the club refuses to carry out the agreement.

The commission decided that the case does not belong to its jurisdiction, and referred it, through President Lynch, to the board of directors of the National league.

Another finding of Chairman Herrmann of the California league, the "outlaw" organization, which recently subscribed to the national agreement, must make personal application for restoration to good standing. This ruling followed a hearing by which outfielder "Happy" Smith of the Oakland club was awarded to the Chicago Nationals.

The Waco club was given five days in which to pay the draft price for Pitcher Holmes, formerly of the New York Nationals, and the application of the New York American league club for a rehearing in the case of pitcher Savage of Waterbury, Conn., was denied.

Chairman Herrmann in his annual report warned club owners against permitting syndicate base ball. If it is attempted, he said, no matter in what league or in what city, prompt action to suppress it must be taken, not only by the national commission, but by everyone interested in the perpetuation of the national game.

He reviewed the work of the commission for 1909, showing 126 findings, rulings and notices had been issued. This represented an increase of 200 per cent over the first year of the commission's existence.

August Herrmann was re-elected chairman and John E. Bruce was again chosen secretary. WILL NOT FIGHT IN UTAH Governor Spry Says Johnson-Jeffries Bout Will Not Be Permitted.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 6.—"It is not possible for that fight to take place here and I will do all in my power to see that the law is if it becomes necessary."

With these words Governor William Spry tonight swung his veto against the fight between Johnson-Jeffries championship contender and disposed of the plan to stage the fight here.

Governor Spry tonight made the following statement in connection with the contest: "The law is so plain in this state that only one construction can be placed on it. It is in my opinion the duty of the state to take place and come within the law. The responsibility, of course, would be upon the promoters of the fight, and I will uphold and take action to see that it is enforced, but in my capacity as governor of the state I will uphold the law if it becomes necessary."
