BERLIN, Jan. 22.—The rise in the private discount rate from 2% to 3 per cent today was due to the German Imperial bank of-fering treasury bills for rediscount. The amount placed, it is estimated, ranges from \$6,259,000 to \$10,000,000. This is the bank's usual method of keeping control of the market by preventing a too heavy fall in market rates like the Bank of England selling consola. Hansen of Brookings, and which new fruit is a cross between the native wild plum and the Chinese Apricot. The convention served to bring out the great strides made by the fruit growers of the state in fitting various fruits to the needs of the state, particularly as to "winterkill," in which marvelous strides have been made the last few years, notably by Prof. Hansen, who has made his little workshop at Brookings of national fame.
