Alarming Condition Developed by Test of the Seed.

OF 200 EARS ONLY 55 ARE GOOD

Bad as is the Condition of Corn in Nebraska, That in lown is Still Worse, According to Test.

There is evident cause for alarm in the seed corn situation in Nebraska, according to the first extensive official test made of corn from all parts of the state to the Omaha Commercial club Here are the results of the first test of

Number germinating atrong with good not growing and showing no Signs of life
Number allve, but weak, small roots
and sprouts
Number mildewed, some sprouting betere rot started

Ears worthless for seed If all the seed corn Nebraska farmers intend to plant this year is as poor as these 200 samples, just 37% per cent of it will grow and the state will have just a liftle better than one-fourth of a crop.

It was really a sad sight when the Commercial club germination box was opened. Six kernels had been taken from each of 200 cars last Thursday and placed in the box, which was kept in the steam heated rooms until Monday. Forty of the little cups were without a sign of life, which means 20 per cent of the corn will not grow at all. ' In sixty-three cups the kernels had sprouted, but some had no roots and others. had roots so weak they were not worth

Some Almost Mildewed. But the worst looking cups were the forty-two filled with rotting corn-some

cups almost full of mildew. Thus the result of the test shows that 145 out of 200 cars are unfit for seed. Some might produce stalks, but would never give

the farmers care.
While this percentage is low, it would have been lower flad not one sample of ten cars come from a professional corn grower who tests his seed, and the sample was either previously tested or taken from stock which had tested high. All ten of these ears grew and showed their ability to produce strong roots. Other than these the best samples of corn came from the Watson ranch near Kearney.

The samples tested were from Petersburg. Blair, Kearney, Nowmans Grove, Water-100, Norfolk, Hadar, Clay Center, Clarkson, Concord, Wakefield, Colridge, Omaha two samples from grain companies which did not give information as to where the seed was secured;

Iowa Still Worse Off. As low as the Nebraska corn tests it gave in this test three times as many strong ears as a test of lows corn made by a Des Moines paper, which showed only eight ears in 100 would produce strong roots and sprouts, indicating its ability to produce corn.

One of the best samples came from Clarkson. It was in two lots, seventeen ears altogether. Only one failed to show life; nine were good, strong ears and seven rather weak-too weak to plant. No mildew was present in any of the samples from Clarkson. Samples from Kearney and vicinity were also free from mildew, while from Concord, Wakefield and Colridge came samples which mildewed badly and would rot in the ground if planted, Douglas county samples showed 52 pe cent good seed, but some samples of yellow

corn mildewed quite badly. This test was made in one of the patent testers, but said by experts to be one of the best which can be used. More than 100 banks in Iowa have used the tester the last month in demonstrating that Iowa corn must be tested.

How Test In Made. Placed in the tester, water at 90 degrees was placed entirely over the corn and it was soaked for fifteen hours. All the water was drawn off-not a drop being al- Rev. E. H.
