Election Bill

Governor Objects to Law to Keep Negroes from Voting on Constitutional Amendments.

GUTHRIE, Okl., March & -- Governor Haskell yesterday vetoed the so-called Taylor election bill under which it is claimed most of the negroes of the state would be barred from voting on cofferitutional amendments. The governor pointed out several features of the bill to which he objected, among them that prohibiting the printing of sample ballots. The Tayfor bill limited the franchise on constitutional amendments to those whose fath-

ers and grandfathers were freeman. In the vetoed measure the provision for ballot title proposing an amendment to the constitution specified that there shall be printed in the title and in the same size type as the title the words "for the amendment" and to make a ballot effective against the proposed amendment a voter is required to strike out every letter of the words "for the amendment" with a black lead pencil.

Otherwise the ballot would be counted for the proposed amendment. It is claimed that large numbers of negroes being illiterate could not discriminate between the words "for the amendment" and the other lines of the ballot title and could not therefore vote as they might desire.
