The Omaha market moved from sixth to fifth position in the receipts of wheat; it remained in second position in the receipt of corn; it moved from fourth to third position in the receipt of oats and in the total receipts of all grain, moved from sixth to fourth position

This is considered a most remarkable situation when it is considered that Omaha has passed many cities which have had their grain markets established many years longer than the Omaha market. These tables for January, 1910, show the strides the Omaha market has been

in church work and was a prominent figure Mrs. Cronk Had Stored Missing Pieces in Council Bluffs in Lawyer's Name.




