Republicans Call Meeting in Des Moines to Organize

GOVERNOR CARROLL'S CLEMENCY

Iowa Executive Pardons Two Girls Arrested for Mitchellville Riot--Dinner Date for Governor Shallenberger.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, March 22--(Special Telegram.)--Stapleholders of Iowa will confer in Des Moines next Thursday in an effort to finish the organization of the state for a straight standard state and congressional ticket at the coming election.

Secretary Bryan will have headquarters opened in Des Moines at the time of the conference.

Governor Pardons Girls. Florence Adams and Lonnie B. Adams, wife of the girls held in the Polk county jail for participation in the Mitchellville riots, were pardoned by Governor Carroll today and sent back to the home.

Shallenberger to Des Moines. Iowa democrats are preparing for a Jefferson day banquet, which will surpass the dollar dinner of the republicans on New Year's day. Committees on arrangements were named today. One of the speakers will be Governor Shallenberger of Nebraska.

No Successor Yet to Cowles. Nothing developed today as to the man who has been selected for place on the state board of control. It is known that the man has been selected, and in fact was picked for the place, so it is stated, before it was decided that Chairman Cowles should be removed or be forced to resign. It is certain that Secretary of State Hayward is not being considered in this connection and, probably some new man will be named.

Soon to Open Headquarters. By April 1 the headquarters of the "Taft club" is to be opened in this city. F. D. Jackson will be personally in charge and J. P. Bryan of Creston is to be campaign manager. A general line up will be made at Iowa. Already organization work is commenced and candidates are being brought out for various positions. Thus far this is the only headquarters to be opened or planned for on the state campaign though a number of candidates on both sides have been actively at work some time.

Guard Armories Deficient. The report of Capt. Dalton of the regular army on the condition of armories in the southern Iowa circuit was received by Adjutant General Logan today. He reports deficient armories for the guard companies in Shenandoah, Creston, Knoxville, Corning, York, Iowa City, Okaloosa, Newton, Centerville, Washington and Fairfield. Unless some better provision is made for armories in each of these towns the company there will be mustered out. The report is not in for the northern regiment. Capt. McDonnell has reported in favor of retaining the Rathsville company and Col. Lucas was sent there today to investigate.

New Bank at Exline. There was filed with the secretary of state today the articles of incorporation of the Bradley Savings bank at Exline, Iowa, with \$25,000 capital. Also the Farmers Co-operative company of Jasper, Poweshiek county, with \$5,000; also the German Farmers Insurance company of Wheatland.

Reappointed Game Warden. The governor has announced the re-appointment for a two-year term of George A. Lincoln as state fish and game warden. Lincoln was formerly mayor of Cedar Rapids and was appointed by Gov. Shaw to his present place. He is responsible almost alone for the hunters' license law which is bringing \$100,000 into the state treasury yearly for the general fund of the state. Numerous candidates were actively seeking the place.

Opens in First District. Col. S. W. Brookhart, one of the Republican candidates for congress in the First congressional district, opened his campaign in a big meeting this evening in Washington, his home town, addressed by himself and by E. L. McCold and C. A. Carpenter. Brookhart is one of Gov. Carroll's military staff and a prominent lawyer. No date has been set for the opening address by Congressman Kennedy.

Probable Suicide Pact. Bureau Carr, of Hamilton, was found dead today in a room filled with gas fumes at an apartment house in Des Moines, while beside him on the floor probably dying, lay William Shack. Both came from Hamilton, Ia. People in the house report a strange scuffle in the room at three o'clock this morning, but the police believe that the men had agreed to end their lives together. Shack cannot live.

OLEO MEN GO TO PRISON Edward Enders and Henry Hinn of Chicago Are Sentenced by Judge Landis.

CHICAGO, March 22--Edward Enders was sentenced to three years in the federal prison at Fort Leavenworth and Henry Hinn to one year in the same prison for violating the law governing the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine. Judge Landis, who pronounced sentence today upon the defendants, also imposed fines of \$5,000 and \$2,500 against the prisoners respectively.

C., March 22--(Special Telegram.)--Senator Burkett today introduced an amendment which he will urge to the general postoffice appropriation bill providing "that heretofore all employed in postoffices having city delivery shall be granted thirty days' leave of absence during each fiscal year with full pay."

tion was made by friends, who recognized the body and clothing. A card found in a pocket bearing a name tallying with the cards and papers found in the debris of the wreck served to identify the body of Louis F. Bleibuch of Muscatine.

Graveyard Scenes in Morgue. The scene at the morgue is gruesome. The little embalming room at the back of the undertaking rooms proved inadequate for the demands made upon it. Furniture was hurriedly removed from a large storeroom adjoining the parlors and here the dead were laid.

Five long rows of bodies extending from the rear to the front filled the whole room, leaving scarcely passageway between for the undertakers.

The debris from the wreck was not cleared away during the night. The morning air is still running over temporary tracks. The two engines still lie to the side of the track. Engine No. 80, the head-one of the double header, was almost entirely buried in the clay bank and lies in the same position.

It was under this engine that Fireman Ross of Cedar Rapids was buried and burned and scalded to death.
