Paris has had so many floods that the mientists and expert watchers of the Scine have classified them and divided them into three groups, according to the height of the water registered on the gauges. It was on this river at Paris that the world's first System for forecasting floods was worked out, in 1854, and it has been in use ever since, so the city authorities of Paris knew two weeks or more ago of the calamity that was in store for them.

Since the daily readings of the flow of the Seine at Paris and other points were begun, in 1732, there have been forty-six floods, counting the present one. According to the classification of height, thirtyone of these were "ordinary," twelve extraordinary" and three "exceptionel," the exceptional ones being those of 1740, 1802

In the century preceding 1723 there were five devastating inundations of the city, that of 1655 being the worst on record, until the present time.

There were not many sheep or yearlings included in today's run, but anything fit to kill in this line has been selling readily on most days lately. A few shorn western lambs were good enough to go at \$0.5 and \$2.5.

For the week thus far supply has been fully normal with the same days last week and the corresponding period of last year. The big end of the run has consisted of lambs in the fleece, largely Colorado-fed Mexicans. Prices showed some improvement during the first three days under the influence of a fairly liberal demand, but week-end trade has been uneven and uncertain and some of the early advance has been wiped out. High-dressing lambs are selling about 150750 higher than a week ago, but the heavier grades are little, if any, higher. The best Mexicans here this week topped at \$0.5 and a small string of fancy spring lambs broke all records at \$18.50. Sheep and yearings have scored nominal advances, but supply has been meager and the market uneven.
