Supreme Court Holds She May Be

County Treasurer. INCUMBENT HELD TO OFFICE

Inspector for Updike Grain Company Finds Wheat Damaged Not to Exceed Ten Per

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 28.—(Special.)—The supreme court holds in the case of Gertrude Jordan of Cherry county that a woman is eligible to the office of county treasurer in the state of Nebraska. Miss Jordon is 30 years of age and has been deputy county treasurer for seven years. She was elected county treasurer of Cherry county last fall, rcelving 25 votes, or a majority of 242 over her opponent, Ernest B. Quible. She qualified for the office and Mr. Quible refused to turn the records over to her, alleging that a county treasurer must be an elector of the county and that as Miss Jordon is not an elector within the meaning of the constitution she was not entitled to the office. Bliss Jordon filed an application for a writ of mandamus to compel him to turn wer to her the books and records of the office and the writ was allowed. Judge Pawcett filed a dissenting opinion.
