NEW YORK, April 8.—The relative activity in the first and last hours of today's stock market rescued it from what would been otherwise the dullest day of the present year and converted the closing into decided animation. The orders whose execution shaped that episode came, apparently, from professional sources. The discussion in stock market circles showed a shift of opinion as to the likely promptitude of a decision by the supreme court in the important cases involving the anti-trust law. Yesterday's anticipation of minimaliate action was changed to growing the end of the resent term of the court of yen until the end of the fall term to attord time for the assimilation of the American Tobacco and Standard Oil cases into one decision.
