RELIGION BIDS COMMUNITY

Presbyterians Discuss Country Church Conditions.

ADDRESS BY DR. W. H. WILSON

Rural Neighborhoods Growing Rich While Churches Do Not Keep Pace—Something is Wrong.

"It is no secret that the country church, as a religious and social center, has lost its former position of prestige and influence. It is reported that there are 11,000 church buildings in the United States out of use and \$100 more that might as well be out of use, so far as organic life and real service are concerned. This is alarming and the conditions responsible deserve careful study."

This assertion of Charles Franklin Curtis, dean of the Iowa Agricultural college at Ames, in his address on "Changes in Agricultural Life and Their Effect on the Country Church" at the "one-day" conference on the country church held at the First Presbyterian church yesterday under the auspices of the department of church and labor of the Presbyterian church, indicated the object of the meeting.

Following the report of the commission appointed by President Roosevelt to inquire into country life conditions and ascertain what was needed to better and improve them in a rational and effective method, the Presbyterian church decided to take the matter up and formed a department known as that of church and labor and the conference held in this city yesterday was under the auspices of the department. Dr. Warren H. Wilson, assistant superintendent of the department, presided and made the principal address at the conference.

Other speakers besides Dr. Wilson and Dean Curtis were Rev. Joseph Hagg of Guthrie Center, Rev. C. H. Purmort of Des Moines and Rev. W. H. Hornell of Ottumwa.

Few Farmers Come.

During the morning and afternoon sessions there was an attendance of between thirty and forty with the lay members of the church predominating. It being the busy season for farmers, only two or three farmers of the soil were in attendance.

Dr. Wilson in his address said in part: "The country church is married to the country community, although these two have not always maintained their ties and obligations. The community has secured its services to a few. But it still remains that the one who can bring the country community up to date, together, is the call of religion."

The church is the sensitive register of the social life and the economic condition of the people. If the church is narrow it becomes a barrier between the community and the social life.
