### Balloons Soar From Fort Omaha

Government's Experimental Tests Are Already Started at Post.

Tired of waiting for propitious weather to meteorological instruments, an attempt was made at an ascension Friday evening and another at 5 o'clock Saturday evening by Prof. C. S. Woods and Prof. W. R. Griggs of the weather bureau from Mount Weather, Va.

Other balloons will be sent up during the comink week. These balloons are provided with self-recording meteorological instruments, which are attached to a parachute to govern their descent when the balloons burst from undue expansion in the higher altitudes. A note is attached to these instruments requesting the finder to return the instruments to Mount Weather at government expense and for which the finder will be reimbursed \$2 for his trouble.

Fifteen or twenty of the balloons will be sent up from Fort Omaha before the experiment is completed here. Specially devised instruments will be attached to the balloons that will be sent up May 18, 11 and 20, during the passage of the earth through the tail of Halley's comet in order to note the effect of the comet's tail upon
