"Mr. President, we do not feel that we are doing anything wrong, but we want to krow. We are engaged in a legitimate 2.459 business, in what we think is a legitimate way. We do not burn, or steal, or exact rebates, or use false weights. Now, we should like to have you look at our contracts and see for yourself just what we 498 are doing. It seems to us there must be some line that business can get within and be safe, and we want to know where it is. CHICAGO The Department of Justice cannot give us advice, and so we have come to you." But the president did not read their con-

tracts. He merely asked them two questions. The first was, 'Do you seek to control prices?' and the second was, 'Do you' it's seek to limit or control output?" To both of these questions the answer was in the affirmative. Thereupon the president spoke to this effect;
