### LULL IN BALLOON FLIGHTS

Aerial Experiments at Fort Omaha Temporarily Suspended.

### SUCCESSFUL ASCENSION IS MADE

Captain Chandler Leads a Sky Party from the Army Post to a Safe Landing Within Precincts of Dundee.

Following at Fort Omaha will take a short test so far as military operations are concerned.  
The student class of twenty officers from the army school at Fort Leavenworth which has been at Fort Omaha for the week returned to Fort Leavenworth Saturday morning.  
An ascension was made Friday evening with the spherical balloon, Captain C. De P. Chandler, Captain R. J. Burr and First Lieutenant W. N. Haskell of the signal corps being in the basket. The ascension was a success, the balloon coming down near Dundee without mishap. The height of about 2000 feet was reached. After its descent the balloon was deflated and brought back to Fort Omaha.  
The intention to send the spherical balloon up Saturday morning for a long flight with Captain Chandler and Lieutenant Haskell as aeronauts was abandoned owing to the inclement weather.  
The German kite balloon was sent up several times Friday evening to a height of about 600 feet, the balloon being made captive. These ascensions were for the purpose of giving the student officers practical lessons in aerostatics.  
There will be no more ascensions until next week and these will be dependent upon the weather. Should all things prove favorable the spherical balloon will be sent on its long flight about the middle of next week with Captain Chandler and Lieutenant Haskell as passengers.  
Considerable interest is being taken in scientific and astronomical circles regarding the sending up of the weather department balloons next week, during the passage of the earth through the tail of Halley's comet.

### BIDS? YES, PLENTY OF THEM

County Commissioners Face Wonderful Tangle of Figures.

### CHEAPER PLANT IS ASSURED

Propositions of Plumbers and Steam Fitters Below Figures at Which They Offered to Do the Work Before.

Bids for plumbing and heating in the new Douglas county court house were opened by the Board of County Commissioners at noon Saturday. This is the second set of bids advertised for. The new figures show that the commissioners will achieve the desired end of getting work done more cheaply than under the rejected bids.  
But there is plenty of chance for much further debate, because it is not easy of hand to say which contractor has bid the lowest, and between the bids of J. J. Hamilton and George Parks & Co., there is room for argument.  
The one and two pipe vacuum heating systems have been bid upon separately as called for by the specifications, and three types of boilers have also been bid upon separately by nearly all the contractors. Tabulating these shows that there are several possible combinations by one of which one contractor will be lowest, and by another combination another bidder.  
J. J. Hamilton's bid is this:  
One pipe vacuum system.....\$40,000  
Two pipe vacuum system.....\$30,000  
Horizontal boiler.....\$4,800  
Fitzgibbon boilers.....\$475

Parks & Co. bid:  
One pipe system.....\$64,750  
Two pipe system.....\$22,825  
Horizontal boiler.....\$4,800  
Fitzgibbon boilers.....\$475

The Johnson-Rowe-Paige company's figures on the same items, given in the same order, are \$66,594, \$24,284, \$5,817 and \$10,200.

Fitzpatrick & Koefler of Columbus, O., bid \$69,387, \$23,872, \$7,617, \$8,287.

The Dixon company of Chicago offers to put in a one-pipe system at \$73,880 and a two-pipe at \$73,990. Boiler figures for this company are \$7,790 and \$8,790.

T. E. Hulse of Omaha made a bid at these figures: \$73,383, \$69,999, \$7,791 and \$10,452.

Bernard Grunwald, lowest bidder on the former specifications, offered \$67,388 for a two-pipe system and left the one-pipe blank. His boiler figures were \$5,900 and \$6,687.

### NESTLEHOUS IS DISCHARGED

Charge of Keeping Gambling House Dismissed—Drunken Complaint Withdrawn.

Judge Crawford discharged both cases against William Nestlehoue alleging he was proprietor of a gambling resort, in a speedy hearing Saturday morning. The court found upon the evidence that Nestlehoue has not actually been proprietor of the establishment over the Budweiser saloon which was alleged to be a gambling place and the secondary charge relating to the character of the place, therefore, could not be sustained against him. The incidental charge against Thomas Dennison was withdrawn by the complaining witnesses.

### HOTEL PLANS CONSIDERED

One Option and Incomplete Plans the Only Real Progress Made in the Project.

A project for the erection of a large hotel at Seventeenth and Douglas streets, which the McCague investment company is handling, has reached the point where an option of the lot directly east of the Morris theater has been gained. This lot is commonly known among real estate dealers as the Kennard property. A proposition for an option has been made to Mrs. M. Maul, owner of the property occupied by the Cole-McKay undertaking company. It is said that the remaining portion of the tract included in the tentative plans for the hotel, owned by E. A. Cudaby, can be taken under option as soon as the Maul property is under control.  
"The whole project is in a chaotic and unsettled state," said John L. McCague. "There is nothing whatever in the report that the incorporation of a hotel company or anything of the kind."  
J. H. Millard and associates in the Omaha National bank, soon to move into new banking rooms at Seventeenth and Farnam streets, of which E. A. Cudaby is also a director, are considering the financing of the proposition.

### BRYAN CUTS LOOSE FROM PALS

Old Guard Will Not Stand Sponsor for Political Meeting.

### TO SPEAK ON PEACE AND WAR

Talks World's Peace in Forenoon to Children and War in Evening to Democrats—Lyle I. Abbott Sponsor.

Lyle I. Abbott, receiver of the Independent Telephone company, head of the State County Option league and booster of the initiative and referendum, is organizing the Bryan political meeting to be held next Tuesday evening at Washington hall.  
It is understood that they do not secure the hall for the meeting and probably will preside and introduce the great traveler.  
Thus Mr. Bryan has definitely broken away from his old-time henchmen in Douglas county. No more will Mayor Dahlman, Tom Flynn and the hearty men of their kind be the avowed agents for democracy's tremendous shadow in his work in this county. In his address Mr. Bryan is not expected to single Mayor Dahlman out for particular denunciation, for they are still good personal friends, but he is expected to state with decided clearness that right here is where open political friendship ceases. He is expected to declare that those who are not openly with him on the initiative and referendum and on county local option are against him. To paraphrase his now famous dictum those who do not stand on the Bryan platform as most recently repaired and reconstructed are as guilty for what they do not declare as for what they advocate boldly.  
In the morning at 10:30 Mr. Bryan will go deeply into the subject of world peace at the Auditorium before an audience to be composed largely of public school children, with enough adults to fill up the seats not taken by the boys and girls. In the evening, after conferences with his newest backers and converts, he will be seen with the political claymore swinging wide and dangerously in the direction of those who do not accept his latest gospel.  
Major Dahlman says that, so far as he knows now, he will be at the Washington hall meeting. It is a certainty his followers are to be on hand, for they expect the meeting will be very interesting.

### NEW BELL PHONE EXCHANGE

'Tyler' Office to Take Overload from Douglas Board.

### DEMANDED BY BIG BUSINESS

Omaha's Commercial Interests Make Necessary Big Increase in Down Town Wire Service—To Double Capacity.

Douglas exchange of the Nebraska Telephone company plant is to be doubled in capacity. In the spring a new switchboard with an ultimate capacity of 10,000 telephones is to be added to the equipment of the exchange, which serves Omaha's growing business district. The new board will for the sake of convenience be known as 'Tyler' exchange. It will give the Douglas street station a total of 26,000 telephones.  
"The new exchange is made necessary by the continuous growth of business in the downtown section," said A. S. Kelly of the traffic department. "It will be installed during the winter and made ready for operation probably early in the spring."  
The name of the new exchange, 'Tyler,' was chosen simply because it is an euphonious prefix for use on telephone numbers.  
"The general offices of the telephone company are soon to be moved into the John L. Kennedy building at Eighteenth and Douglas streets, and the new switchboard is to be installed in the vacated quarters left by the moving of the office."
