Shippers Are to Meet Wickersham

Delegations Start for Capital to Make Complaint to Attorney General on Rates Tuesday.

With plans complete for the meeting with the attorney general in Washington, where the western shippers are to ask for action against the railroads under the Sherman act, E. J. McVann, head of the traffic bureau of the Omaha Commercial club, left for Washington Saturday.

Information received here Saturday denoted a large attendance of shippers from the principal towns of the territory represented at the meeting held on Tuesday in Omaha. They will meet at the Willard hotel Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock to confer about the state of the proposition to be made to Attorney General Wickersham at 3 o'clock that afternoon.

The agitation raised by the shippers following the Omaha meeting has borne fruit in the form of a shower of telegrams to the members of congress attracting wide attention in Washington.
