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of time to send the measure to conference, About the only supporters of immediate statehood in the senate are on the demo cratic side, and they want the house bill passed, as that would mean statehood for Arizona and New Mexico in time for the fall elections, and they think it would mean four additional democratic senators. The senate bill, which is favored by republican senators, would merely authorize the territories to take the preliminary steps and would not make it possible for them to be admitted to the unlor of states until congress had approved their

roposed constitutions. Even if the postal savings bank bil should pass the nouse and successfully emerge from the conference, it is believed that it would be a long time before any postal banks could be established under its provision. The sundry civil bill does no contain an appropriation to put the postal banks in force, and some of the house leaders are responsible for a report that this legislation will be ignored in the general deficiency bill.
