Propositions on Which Members Are Casting Ballots Includes Issue of \$150,000 Mortgage Bonds.

The Omaha club is now polling the membership with reference to the proposed enlargement of the club house and other mprovements.

The estimated cost of the remodeling planned is \$100,000, while the present indebtedness of the club, covered by mortgage maturing shortly, amounts to \$50,000.
