Supreme Court Decides Law of 1907 is Valid.

SWOBODA CASE FROM OMAHA

Court Holds Man Suing the Union Pacific Was Engaged in Construction and Repair Work.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, June 10.—(Special.)—The supreme court has upheld the validity of the employers' liability act passed by the legislature of 1907.

Appeal Dismissed.

The appeal of the Board of County Supervisors of Dodge county in the case of James W. Cattien is dismissed.

Stock Yards Hearing Over.

The hearing on the application of the stock yards for a permit from the State Railway commission to increase its switching charges came to a close today.

Mr. Wetling testified that the stock yards handled 20,000 revenue cars during 1909, of which 196,000 were live stock and 84,000 packing house and miscellaneous cars.
