"The foregoing covers cases where crit icism is unjust, but that must be expected, and does not in any way excuse an em ploye for bringing criticism on himself (or George McClain, president of Iowa State the company) by being caught off guard

"Unfortunately there are many cases where criticism is just, and the conscien tious man feels it severely. There are inexperienced employes who will some day oc cupy prominent positions, and be considered gentlemanly in the extreme, who did no appreciate the importance of this subject in their younger days in the service. There are some, of course, who purposely make it disagreeable for the public by belittling the subject or question brought up and whose consciences do not cause them to lose any sleep; these, however, do not usually accomplish much, and in many instances their duty is changed, or their relations with the company have been severed, so they do not come in contact with patrens. No matter how busy we may be, a courteous reply is absolutely essential to the most innocent question and the habit should be cultivated.

"A discourteous reply should never be given under any circumstances, regardless of the provocation received. The railroad getting the most passenger and freight business today is the one offering the best service, the one with the most courteous and loyal employes.

"Every employe is a solicitor, not by direct application, but by his bearing toward the public and his assistance in making the service offered by his road attractive This applies particularly to employes of the ticket and freight crews, the baggage rooms and to the train crews. Do not forret a pleasant "hello!" with an effort t satisfy queries on the telephone; this is

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
