

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Dry Weather Continues in the Northwest Where Rain is Needed.

NEW WHEAT MOVES EARLY

Cash Wheat is Unchanged and Rather Dull Because of Reports of the Early Shipments of a New Wheat.

OMAHA, June 15.

Dry weather continues in the northwest and until good rains have fallen there is danger of crop damage in the spring wheat section.

Leading bears are predicting an early movement of new winter wheat which is thought to be a factor in the market.

Wheat was unchanged and rather dull owing to reports of early shipments of a new wheat.

The corn market held steady and firm on good cash demand and light receipts.

Clearances were 7,000 bu. of corn, 2,000 bu. of wheat and flour equal to 140,000 bu.

Eric Shows Some Strength Believed to Be Due to Evidence of Improvement in Terminal Facilities.

NEW YORK, June 15.—The stock market at present possesses no distinctive feature except its apathy.

This apathy was supposed to be due to the fact that the market was saturated with offerings.

Other special factors contributed to the strength of Eric was supposed to be due to the evidence of improvement in its terminal facilities.

Announcement of a traffic agreement between the Pacific and St. Louis & San Francisco ironed out a strong influence on the market.

A pronounced recession in foreign exchange rates was the chief cause of the market's weakness.

Row in Cheyenne City Council

Judge Re-Seats Councilmen Ousted by Mayor Cook—Move to Depose Executive on Foot.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 15.—(Special).—By an order of Judge J. C. Craig of the Fourth Judicial District, who assessed all costs in the case against Mayor P. S. Cook, Councilman Henry Sweet (rep.) and H. E. Gates (dem.) are restored to their seats in the city council, from which they were ousted by Mayor Cook several weeks ago.

Mayor Cook had been having trouble with the democratic majority of the council over the city's plans for an enlarged water system, and Sweet had joined the democrats in preventing the mayor carrying out the plans in some respects.

Mayor Cook created a sensation about six weeks ago by declaring the seats of Sweet and Gates vacant and instructing Marshall Maxwell to escort the ousted aldermen from the council chamber.

The mayor justified his action on the ground that Sweet and Gates had removed from the wards from which they were elected, and cited an opinion of Attorney General B. H. Ladd to that effect.

It is rumored today that the democratic majority of the council, aided by Sweet (rep.) may depose Mayor Cook and elect an acting mayor in his place. It is not known what grounds the democrats will base this action, if the step is taken.
